# This Past Sunday in the NOW Sermon Series:

- This past Sunday I preached from Mark 14:12-21 with a sermon entitled 'A Snake in the Grass!'.
  - o In this sermon, we looked at the passover meal and how Judas was a snake in the grass.
  - In this sermon we were able to see the contrast of Jesus in His Grace, and Judas in his selfishness.
- This past Sunday I asked the question: How does Jesus show in the upper room that He is Sovereign and all knowing?
  - Truth #1: The Savior is in Control. (vv. 12-16)
  - Truth #2: A Snake is not in Control. (vv. 17-21)

- Based on this past Sunday's sermon, are you a snake in the grass biting other people?
- Or, are you aware of those who may be snake's in the grass in your life?

'Oh What a Night!'
Mark 14:22-52

### Sermon in a Sentence:

It was an 'Oh What a Night' kind of moment when the Authority, Anticipation, Agony, Arrest and Anonymous all occurred the night before Jesus would die on Calvary's Cross.

#### Intro:

- Growing up as a kid, one of my fondest memories is hearing music most all of the time.
  - Whether in the car, on vacation, or sitting at home, my grandparents made it a point to always have music on and playing.
- My grandparents grew up in the 60s, and they loved Franki Valli and the Four Seasons.
  - One song I remember hearing quite a bit, was 'December, 1963, or what a night!'
  - The song was released in 1975, but I remember on different occasions when my grandad would go and visit in the nursing homes, I would get to tag along and he'd set up the equipment for me to be able to sing to the senior adult residents.
- The story behind the song is quite interesting...

- Bob Guaudio who was a singer and songwriter for the Four Seasons, wrote the lyrics to the song.
- Originally, its lyrics were set in 1933 in New Jersey when it was announced that prohibition had been repealed.
  - The title was originally 'December 5th, 1933'.
- To make the song a bit more 'family friendly' since the Four Seasons audience catered to families, Judy Parker, Bob Guadio's girlfriend decided to change the lyrics to when she and Bob first met.
  - The song became a hit, and even helped to coin the phrase 'Oh What a Night!'.
- But long before the song was ever written there was quite a night that was unlike any other.
  - The night before Jesus died on Calvary's Cross was quite eventful.
  - Since there are many events that occurred in our text tonight, we are going to summarize these verses as we go through them.

### **Question to Ask:**

What happened on the night before Jesus went to Calvary's Cross to be crucified?

• 'And as they were eating, he took bread, and after blessing it broke it and gave it to them, and said, "Take; this is my body." 23 And he took a cup, and when he had given thanks he gave it to them, and they all drank of it. 24 And he said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. 25 Truly, I say to you, I will not drink again of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God."

- Jesus changed the passover to the First Lord's Supper.
- V. 24, the New Covenant.

## Truth #2: The Anticipation. (vv. 26-31)

- 'And when they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. 27 And Jesus said to them, "You will all fall away, for it is written, 'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be scattered.' 28 But after I am raised up, I will go before you to Galilee." 29 Peter said to him, "Even though they all fall away, I will not." 30 And Jesus said to him, "Truly, I tell you, this very night, before the rooster crows twice, you will deny me three times." 31 But he said emphatically, "If I must die with you, I will not deny you." And they all said the same.'
- In verse 27 the idea is not to lose faith permanently but to temporarily lose courage.

Truth #1: The Authority. (vv. 22-25)

Truth #3: The Agony. (vv. 32-42)

And they went to a place called Gethsemane. And he said to his disciples, "Sit here while I pray." 33 And he took with him Peter and James and John, and began to be greatly distressed and troubled. 34 And he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death. Remain here and watch."[d] 35 And going a little farther, he fell on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him. 36 And he said, "Abba, Father, all things are possible for you. Remove this cup from me. Yet not what I will, but what you will." 37 And he came and found them sleeping, and he said to Peter, "Simon, are you asleep? Could you not watch one hour? 38 Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation. The spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." 39 And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words. 40 And again he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were very heavy, and they did not know what to answer him. 41 And he came the third time and said to them, "Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? It is enough; the hour has come. The Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. 42 Rise, let us be going; see, my betrayer is at hand."

# • V. 36, Jesus was submissive to God's Will.

- He prayed to be spared death was answered, but it was in accordance with the divine will of God.
- God gave His Son something even better than what He had prayed for, 'VICTORY OVER DEATH'.

### Truth #4: The Arrest. (vv. 43-50)

• 'And immediately, while he was still speaking, Judas came, one of the twelve, and with him a crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests and the scribes and the elders. 44 Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying, "The one I will kiss is the man. Seize him and lead him away under guard." 45 And when he came, he went up to him at once and said, "Rabbi!" And he kissed him. 46 And they laid hands on him and seized him. 47 But one of those who stood by drew his sword and struck the servant[e] of the high priest and cut off his ear. 48 And Jesus said to them, "Have you come out as against a robber, with swords and clubs to capture me? 49 Day after day I was with you in the temple teaching, and you did not seize me. But let the Scriptures be fulfilled." 50 And they all left him and fled.'

#### • Vv. 44-45

- The particular sign being used as a betrayal kiss is interesting here.
- It's puzzling because nowhere else is Jesus greeted by a disciple with a kiss.
- According to 1 Samuel 10:1, 2 Samuel 19:40,
   Luke 7:38 and Acts 20:37 it was a sign of homage and respect.
- Verse 50, the word 'all' in the Greek text is last in the sentence. For emphasis.

# Truth #5: The Anonymous. (vv. 51-52)

- 'And a young man followed him, with nothing but a linen cloth about his body. And they seized him, but he left the linen cloth and ran away naked.'
- This incident is only recorded in Mark's Gospel.
  - Which leads most scholars to believe that Mark is talking about himself.
  - It's possible that Mark was talking about himself here, due to the modesty of not including his own name.
    - Some call it the 'signature in the corner of his work'.
  - But, speculation about who this individual was is certainly profitless due to the fact that we simply just down't know.
- But, the lack of identity invites you and I as readers to examine our own readiness to abandon Jesus.
  - This scripture, oddly enough, fufills Amos 2:16...
  - o 'and he who is stout of heart among the mighty shall flee away naked in that day," declares the LORD.' Amos 2:16
